FURTHER TO THE LANCASHIRE WEAVERS STORY - The Fining System

Another disagreeable feature of factory life at this time (circa 1840) was the growing practice of the employers in Fining their workpeople. Fining was no modem invention, as it was older than the factory system itself. At the time when the merchant put out warps to be woven by the handlook weaver he reserved to himself a "power of abatement" for deficiency in workmanship. With the commencement of the factory era the system developed into something of a fine art. In the hands of the greedy designing employer it could be made to yield the equivalent of an all-round reduction in wages. In the "Poor man's Advocate", 1832 many instance are given of fines upon spinners, for "rubbed cops", i.e. Over-large cops, 1s. to 2s 6d.; waste found in the necessary, 1s. each spinner; ten minutes late, 1s.; day off without permission 12s.; gas, six lights, 2s.6d.; three lights, 1s.3d.; gas, reelers, 1s.; hot water for tea, 3d., 2d., or 1d.

In another mill operatives paid the engineer a penny a week to send up the steam early to heat the spinning room. There was also a fining system knows as the "grassing" system, where an operative was suspended for several days. The spinners and others vigorously resisted this method, with success. (A copy of Mill Rules will come later.)
