New fees for E ngland and Wales certificates

In April the standard charge for ordering birth, death and marriage certificates for England and Wales from the General Record Office (GRO) increases to £9.25. The amount will be the same whether or not you know the reference number. Last orders at the old rate of £7 must be with the NZSG Purchasing Officer by Saturday 3 April. (Orders through the NZSG Purchasing Officer are for members of the national society only.)

Book review

Census: The Expert Guide, by Peter Christian and David Annal. 250+ pages. This is a compelling, up-to-the-minute guide to using the England census in your family history research. Written by a bestselling genealogy author and a National Archives expert, Census shows how to interpret intricate details of your ancestors lives. It explores how information was gathered on names, addresses, family relationships and occupations, revealing why 'mysteries' occur and what may be hidden between the lines. Also includes the 1911 Irish census. The branch has a copy of this book to raffle at the March branch meeting.

Another brickwall crumbles

For some years my 4xgreat grandmother, Elizabeth Blake, was a bit of a mystery. We couldn't find a death for her. She married Isaac Maddocks on 16 July 1835 in Bath, Somerset, England. It seems it wasn't a happy marriage. By the 1851 census, Elizabeth was on her own with the three children. To survive, Elizabeth had to work as a shoe binder. Throughout his life, Isaac lived in the workhouse, where he died 24 April 1898.

A search of other census records did not shed any further light on Elizabeth, so I assumed she had died before the 1861 census. A search of the English death records, however, did not say when she died. I decided she had missed being included on the indexes and left it at that.

Some years later, I scrolled through the microfiche at the National Library, looking for marriages of Maddocks children in the Gloucester area. I found a marriage for an Elizabeth Maddocks. Thinking she might be related to the family, I used the online indexes and cross-referenced the spouse. This Elizabeth had married Charles Woodman in 1870.

I didn't take much notice of the husband's name until one day I happened to look at the 1861 census. On this census was Edwin Maddocks, the son of Elizabeth and Isaac. Also listed were Charles Woodman and his wife Elizabeth. This Elizabeth was the right age for my Elizabeth. She was living with Charles. However, to save face they gave the relationship to the head of the house as wife.

In 1870 he decided to do the right thing and marry her. The marriage was registered on 13 June 1870. On the 1871 census she is with her husband Charles and a lodger. William Privett.

By 1881 Elizabeth was living with her daughter Jane and son James. William Privett was now the head of the house and Elizabeth was recorded as a widow. By 1891, sadly, the children were in the workhouse. The census did not turn up an Elizabeth Woodman, so I assumed she had died. I was intrigued that William Privett had lived with the family for a number of years. I searched the 1891 census for William Privett only to find he now had a wife Elizabeth, aged 73, born in Lincolnshire, Stamford: the right age and birth place for my Elizabeth.

A search of the marriage indexes showed Elizabeth Woodman married William Privett in 1882. I purchased the marriage certificate, which proved it was my Elizabeth. They were married on 10 October 1882.

At last I found her death, as Elizabeth Privett, on 19 October 1895. What I discovered was that Elizabeth was a bigamist, not once but twice. There was never a divorce between her and her first husband, Isaac Maddocks. Her third husband, William Privett, was 20 years her junior. Her first husband outlived her by three years. - *Sue Greene*
