Sir Jon Trimmer is YURU 2011 guest

We are pleased to confirm that our "Why You Are You (YURU) 2011 guest is Sir Jon Trimmer. Ballet lovers will be familiar with this leading star who first joined the then New Zealand Ballet Company in 1958 before heading overseas to study and work at the Royal Ballet School, Sadler's Wells Ballet, Australian Ballet and Danish Ballet. Returning to New Zealand in 1970, he helped revive the New Zealand company and became its principal male dancer. He remains with the Royal New Zealand Ballet Company and tours in several productions this year. Recognised for his services to ballet with an MBE in 1974, Sir Jon was knighted in 1999. He lives in Paekakariki with his wife Jacqui. Sir Jon, a fifth-generation Kiwi, will be touring on a different note as YURU guest, telling the story of his family history to audiences as part of Family History Month in August. His Kapiti presentation as part of the Wellington region's events will be at matinee and evening shows on Thursday 18 August at Southwards Car Museum and theatre complex, Otaihanga. He will also present it at the Family History Fair in Hamilton on Saturday 27 August, all this in between rehearsals for the RNZBC tour of *The Sleeping Beauty* in October. Sir Jon has a relative in the South Island who is an NZSG member and a sister in Hamilton who are helping the production team with the family story.

T weets from West Yorkshire

The West Yorkshire Archive Service is using new technology to tell people about WW2 bombing raids of seventy years ago. With information from the West Riding of Yorkshire Air Raid Precaution (ARP) logs, the archives is using Twitter to share the events of 1941, when that area suffered its heaviest bombing raids. Twitter is a website that lets people send and receive short messages ("tweets") of up to 140 characters on cellphones or using the internet.

The archives tweets include reports of air raid alerts, bombing incidents, unexploded bombs and aircraft crashes, as well as friendly advice about how to stay safe during the war. Each tweet goes out near the time of the real incident, giving a flavour of the time. They include links to historic photos of people wearing gas masks and other wartime images. http://twitter.com/WR_ARP

New Zealand census cancelled for 2011

So much for this year's census! Much of the census administration was done from Christchurch, so with the Statistics New Zealand building badly damaged in the 22 February earthquake, and many people displaced from their usual homes, the head count for this year was cancelled. The people organising it probably wish it had been scheduled for a month earlier. Then they would have up-to-date information that would have made measuring the effects of the earthquake much easier.

It goes without saying that our sympathies are with the people of Christchurch, who have more pressing concerns than genealogy just now. The latest newsletter from the Canterbury branch says all meetings are cancelled, and the branch library and family history centre are closed until further notice.

Have you got an earthquake story?

Members of the Canterbury branch are being urged to write about their own earthquake experiences, to pass on to future generations. Many of us on the North Island who didn't feel the tremor still have stories to tell about friends or relations caught up in the chaos, and our sometimes frantic attempts to get in touch with them. They're worth a mention when you write down your own family stories. We all live in the context of New Zealand's history.

This might be a good time to back up or copy your data, and share it with someone who lives in another place, so if a big one happens here and you have to leave home in a hurry, at least your records will be safe, somewhere.

This became an interest after finding ten dentists in the family. **Bill Carter** showed photos of the changing land use on a Pitt Island farm that had been in his family for eight generations. **Deborah Shuker** talked about researching in person in Denmark, and what she'd learned there about churches, farming, chimney cleaning and the reasons people migrated.
