Book review – By Bill McKeich.

A recent addition to the books held in the Alison Proctor Family History Centre is "Gabriel Read of Gabriel's Gully" by Ernie McCraw. ISBN 978-0-473-18513-8

This book was launched in March 2011 by the author at the 150th Celebrations of the discovery of gold in the gully behind Lawrence which became known as Gabriel's Gully.

For any genealogist interested in the discovery of gold in the Tuapeka District during the 1860's this book is a must read. Of particular interest are the letters which Gabriel Read wrote to members of the Otago Provincial Council and the replies he received back. The contents of these letters gives a good insight into the excitement and frustration miners endured in their quest for gold and in particular Gabriel Read's own involvement in the discovery of gold not only in Gabriel's Gully behind Lawrence in June 1861 but also in many other parts of Otago.

The author Ernie McCraw, has spent a lifetime living in the Tuapeka area and has drawn on the many resources available in Museums and Archives throughout the country. Many of the letters and photographs are published for a first time.

I would thoroughly recommend this book to all and who knows your family name may even be mentioned in the index.

Is It Time for the Digital Public Library of America?

A new project is underway with the stated goal to "make the cultural and scientific heritage of humanity available, free of charge, to all."

The project has the backing of some "heavy hitters," including David S. Ferriero, the archivist of the United States.

In an article in the New York Times, Miguel Helft describes the formation of a non commercial public digital library. The project is in its infancy. It has no formal structure other than a steering committee. It has formed six working groups to study the project's scope, financing, governance, legal hurdles, technical issues and audience.

"Everyone who is at the table has a different idea of audience, scope, content and governance," said David S. Ferriero, the archivist of the United States, who backs the project and attended the October meeting. "All those issues need to be worked through."
