Australasian Federation of Family History Organisations congress (AFFHO)

16-20 January 2009 Kings College, Auckland

The New Zealand Society of Genealogists is hosting this congress, which is held every three years. It replaces the Queen's Birthday conference in 2009.

The theme is Preserving the past for the

future, and there are four streams: Migration, History, Technology and Preservation. Over four days there will be 14 lectures in each stream, as well as eight plenary lectures and a number of two-hour workshops.

Introducing Kay Carter

How I wish I could talk to my mother again! The older family members have the stories! A cousin told me my mother's GALLAHER family was too complicated. I talked to more cousins and slowly began to piece the story together. Then it all got too hard and I tackled the much easier story of my father's FISHER family. Those great-grandparents had six children, only three of whom had married.

My first book, Fishers of Pukerimu, was launched in 1997 at a family reunion and is now referred to as the family bible. I took family history from what I knew, and researched. I was helped greatly by local historians and began to find my way around genealogical resources and references. I made a trip to Scotland to complete the work. But I also encouraged family members to contribute their own stories.

It was time to get back to the GALLAHER story. My great-grandparents James and Maria had 14 children. It was James' second marriage and he was 35 years older than Maria. They settled in Katikati with six surviving Irish-born children, and had a further four sons. Maria, a teacher and the breadwinner, died aged 42. As they grew older, some went to Australia in search of gold.

How did I find them? I rang all the Gallahers in □ Clive Palmer the Perth and Melbourne phone books with great success. I filled in the gaps by free advertising in the local main papers. I am now in touch with descendants of all 10 children.

Branch meeting reports

How my research affected others

In October, Kay Carter told about going to Donegal, Ireland, the birthplace of a relation, Dave Gallaher, who happened to have been

the captain of the famous 1905 Originals All Black team.

Subscriptions for the current period fell due on The discovery by the local Donegal rugby club that their area had produced this sporting hero inspired them to invite the current All Black team to dedicate their new sports ground in 2005, in an attempt to increase local interest in the game.

> Kay supplied the club with photos and information about Dave Gallaher, which was used to publicise his birthplace. She showed a DVD at the meeting which documented the rugby club's story, including the huge media interest generated by All Blacks' visit to Donegal.

Adding science to genealogy

At the September branch meeting, Lorna Henderson told how DNA test results had changed the focus of her family history research. Before, she was looking for dead ancestors, but now she's looking for living relations, and she's found a few of them this way. The DNA test results can't say how you are related to the person, only that you have a common ancestor.

Lorna compared the cost and services of different companies offering DNA testing for genealogy, and suggested some things to check in choosing a company: security provisions, database size, scientific background, additional services, and whether samples are retained for upgraded tests. It sounds a bit complicated, but basic information on how it works is available on www.wikipedia.com [search keyword: DNA].
