#### Convenor's comment

We have just returned from a long-planned five-week journey through the USA, catching up with old friends, and expanding our horizons and judgment of that country, from those limited trips years ago with the kids to Disneyland, the odd business visit to Washington DC and not always accurate media master mariner with EIC. impressions. And what a time to be there presidential and vice-presidential debates, the Wall Street debacle, pork barreling congress negotiations, the UN General Assembly, and reminder of the huge global influence of the USA.

Our journey took us through Sunnyvale, California, the deserts of Nevada with the

crazy Las Vegas, the canyons and more desert of Arizona and Utah, Rocky Mountain terrain of Colorado, Houston after Hurricane Ike, the civil war territory near Beaufort, Southern Carolina and finally Yankee country - the teeming metropolis of New York. Not a complete sample of the geographic, political, religious and ethnic diversity, but sufficient to be impressed by the friendliness, service, and hospitality of Americans.

From a genealogical perspective, the ethnic diversity constantly strikes home. Every bookshop and library abounds with historical and genealogical material. They provide a constant reminder of the huge influence on early US history of the colonial conquests of Spain, France and England. As many people speak Spanish in California as English. Indigenous Indian culture is a sad travesty of earlier times and we saw a little of the inhospitable reservations in Utah and Arizona.

But New York is the real reminder of the impact of immigration and the modern ethnic mix. Nearly every language in the world is spoken here and every street teems with this racial mix of 18 million - legal and illegal. The Jewish new year was being celebrated on our first few days in NYC with family groups strolling through Central Park in their best clothes. The day we visited Empire State Building, Fifth Ave was the scene of Polish national celebrations with a day-long parade.

And so is New Zealand becoming increasingly multi-ethnic - recent new citizenship ceremonies in Wellington and our own Kapiti Coast are testament to this. Good to be home, but here's to diversity!

I began my research 26 years ago, mainly to discover my HARDING family as I'd heard so many stories about their upbringing and antics. I started with Granddad's death certificate from GRO, to discover where he was born, etc - Limehouse, MDX, father John a

However, never give up! I have just returned from meeting a second cousin once removed in Woodford, northwest of Brisbane. It's the wife of one of the descendants who's doing a marvellous job and has let me view her Ancestor Tree online. I've found a whole new and delightful family. Sue and I spent a day with them. They had no idea of New Zealand relatives.

It's been a case of beavering away, with great help from Levin/Rotorua groups, and now I have nine family trees. I am a member of Legacy and am slowly downloading and have yet to install Legacy 7. When I joined Kapiti Branch it was with several blank walls and I doubt if some will be cracked. I'd like a year's leave plus an open cheque book to 'discover' in person! My motto would be Robert Bruce's: Try, try again! and add ask, ask again. I am amazed at how many relatives have no idea other relatives' existence. I've enjoyed meeting with several of them. In fact in recent - Clive Palmer weeks one has come to live in Waikanae. How's that? Good hunting!
