Kings College, Auckland

The New Zealand Society of Genealogists is hosting this congress, which is held every three years. It will replace the Queen's Birthday conference in 2009.

future, and there are four streams: Migration, History, Technology and Preservation. Over four days there will be 14 lectures in each stream, as well as eight plenary lectures and a number of two-hour workshops.

I haven't found out which colliery he worked for yet, and need to investigate whom he took a case against. I really enjoy finding out the interesting little 'titbits' of information. It makes people more real than just a date of birth or death.

My family seems to have come mainly from the Nottinghamshire, Sheffield, Derbyshire areas but I am sure as I delve further into my 'tree' I'll find people in other areas. I am enjoying genealogy but find it frustrating at times not to be able to go further down the particular track I am investigating.

I've had a couple of breakthroughs with my English family. I've managed to contact two cousins who have given me bits for their family but nothing going back which, of course, is what I really want. My husband's side of the family came from England and emigrated first to Canada and then to New Zealand (Kaitaia). If anyone has any interests in any of these areas, I'm happy to share information.

Recommended reading

"Old Christchurch in Picture and Story" by Johannes C Andersen, published in 1949. If you have an interest in early Christchurch this is a great book. It is mainly pre-1900 but there are some mentions up to 1920. Subjects mentioned vary from the building of the Cathedral to Mumford the fruiterers' son eating a banana. Good social history, some maps of commercial building areas and descriptions of walks through the town plus of course the wonderful photos. As is usual for the time, the index is not very detailed, but it's an interesting read in the hope of finding something pertinent to your research. If you have access it is borrowable from Wellington Library NZ section (993.171 AND) or through Kapiti Library via interloan.
