Celebrating 25 years of Kapiti Branch

What a lot of family history research has been done in Kapiti in the last 25 years! Back in May 1984, June Pritchett chaired a meeting of 22 enthusiastic family historians and the result was the formation of a steering committee for a local genealogy society. Kapiti Branch now has ten times that number, at 220 members.

Members are invited to a special celebration at the time and place of our usual monthly branch meeting – Tuesday 26 May at the Kapiti Community Centre, starting with drinks and nibbles at 7pm.

The highlight of the evening will be the *Why You Are You (YURU)* presentation of the family history of Raumati author, journalist and radio producer, Anna Kenna. Some members saw a preview of this at the Find Your Family expo at Coastlands last Labour Weekend, but research never stops, and this presentation will include the latest findings. Volunteers from Kapiti Branch provided the expert research knowhow Anna needed to find out about her family in Ireland.

In honour of the occasion, we have invited some official guests, including Kapiti District Council mayor Jenny Rowan and the president of the New Zealand Society of Genealogists, David Bryant.

Join us for an entertaining evening and a slice of anniversary cake. Visitors are welcome, but there will be a door charge of \$5 for non-members.

National Library renovation

Branch meeting report – April

Welcome to the branch committee, Bill McKeich! Bill joins returning committee members who were re-elected at the AGM at the April meeting. The full list of elected committee members can be seen on page 4. Responsibilities of members will be confirmed at the June committee meeting.

After the AGM, we heard about the resources now available at the Alison Procter Family History Centre, located upstairs at Paraparaumu Library. Resources are accessible to members any time the library is open, by presenting your branch membership card and Kapiti Coast library card at the information desk.

Bev Chappell showed some samples from the book collection, including:

- *For Your Tomorrow* (volume 3), a collection of brief biographical notes on New

Zealand airforce casualties

- a selection of family histories, including some written by Kapiti branch members
- Phillimore's atlas and index, which shows boundaries of English parishes
- genealogy magazines, such as *Ancestors*. You can join a round robin to read the newest issues of these. See details on our branch website www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~nzlsgkb.

Derek Griffis gave a rundown on the branch collection of 10,000 microfiche, which includes New Zealand electoral rolls and monumental inscriptions, as well as indexes to births, deaths and marriages from New Zealand, New South Wales and Victoria.

New Zealand births, deaths and marriages can now be searched online at www.dia.govt.nz, but by searching the fiche you can overcome the problem of variations in spelling and mistakes in transcription. Any anticipated entry "not" found on the website may yet be found on the microfiche. Registration district codes listed on the fiche (not those on the website) can be checked against the district key books to establish where in New Zealand the event took place.

Clive Palmer and Sue Greene talked about websites and databases available on the branch computers. Using these computers, members can get free access to ancestry.com and findmypast.com, two databases of overseas genealogy records, which are extensive (and expensive if you have to subscribe yourself).

They provide British census records for 1841, 1851, 1861, 1871, 1881, 1891 and 1901, selected ship's passenger lists, some military records, and much more. Instructions for using the computer (including the password) are in a booklet kept in the locked cupboard. Sign out the key at the library information desk.

On the web

Blue Books 1840-1855

All 24 of these early New Zealand public records are now available online at www.archives.govt.nz. The Blue Books were produced in all British colonies to provide information to officials in England. They include statistics on population, trade, churches, schools, prisons and all manner of things, as well as records about individuals who worked for the including government, their date of appointment and salary.

Crew List Index Project

Findmypast.com now has indexes to lists of crew members working on British merchant ships between 1860 and 1913. Over 270,000 merchant seafarers are included in the crew list indexes, which were completed by ships every six months, from captains to able seamen to engine room staff and stewardesses.

Scotland's Old Parish Registers online

It's homecoming year in Scotland. Find out more at ancestralscotland.com, where you can sign up for an e-newsletter and receive free credits to use on Scotlandspeople, the official source of records for Scotland. Old Parish Registers are now available online at www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk.
