Bolton Street Cemetery - July meetings

Barbara Mulligan of Friends of Bolton Street Cemetery provided an interesting presentation at the Branch evening meeting in July and kindly allowed her Powerpoint demonstration to be offered to the day group the following afternoon.

Barbara, who is also involved with Karori cemetery, described herself as a taphophile, a lover of cemeteries and gravestones. She explained that the aim of her presentation was to answer the question "Can I find my ancestor at Bolton Street Cemetery?"

The cemetery was opened in 1840. However, Barbara's talk went back earlier than that, showing the plan that had been drawn up in England, with no knowledge of the rugged topography of Wellington. The original plan was for a town cemetery for everyone, regardless of religious affiliation, unlike the churchyard cemeteries of England.

This didn't last long, with separate parts for Church of England, dissenters and Jews being established by 1851. Catholics were buried at Mount Street cemetery, near Victoria University. The Church of England's sexton's cottage, which remains today, was built in 1857.

With the growth of Wellington, the cemetery became surrounded by development, and was closed for burials, except in existing family plots in 1882, with the opening of the Karori cemetery. The last burial in Bolton Street is believed to have been in 1967.

A major controversy occurred with the motorway construction starting in the 1960s. This required disinterment of about 3700 graves, and reburial in the Memorial Vault, with the relocation of memorials and gravestones throughout the cemetery. Friends of Bolton Street Inc (FOBSC) was formed in 1977.

The cemetery contains the remains of many well-known citizens of Wellington, but also ordinary people. "Unquiet Earth" published by Margaret Alington in 1978 provides a detailed history of the cemetery but has been long out-of-print. So how do you discover whether relatives are buried in the cemetery?

The FOBSC burial list at https://boltoncemetery.org.nz/burial-list/search/ has about 10,000 names. It contains biographical information and a reference to the gravestone location, which is shown on a large grid map in the Bolton Street Cemetery Museum.

Searching the Wellington City Council cemetery search and plot locator for Bolton Street Cemetery at

https://wellington.govt.nz/cemeteries leads to an online map and image of the gravestone location. The Branch will be organising a guided tour of the cemetery early in 2025.



Don't forget, in all the fuss about Ancestry's Enhanced Shared Matches, that MyHeritage has offered this for years, along with chromosome details - which are not available at Ancestry.

Make the best of both worlds, upload your Ancestry DNA file into MyHeritage for free and pay the oneoff unlock fee to access the DNA smarts. You may well tap into a whole different set of matches, given not everyone tests at Ancestry.

Since the last newsletter FTDNA has announced that they are retiring their Family Tree functionality. All trees already there and not migrated to MyHeritage will become Read Only on **9th September 2024**, going from this FTDNA Tree below - to this - MyHeritage Tree





Do read all the ins and outs of the tree building and maintenance that can now be done, far more efficiently, on MyHeritage, and in particular all the details about the **optional** transfer of your FTDNA tree to MyHeritage without losing the DNA linkages that give you the dinky little Paternal / Maternal symbols against the matches that can be assigned to a "side".

If you do this transfer I strongly recommend that you review all your privacy settings on the tree linked to your DNA – see the MyHeritage Family Tree menu > Manage trees for the tree concerned Roberta Estes blog post and video about this: https://dna-explained.com/2024/07/27/update-and-webinar-familytreedna-myheritage-tree-integration/

Note:

FTDNA have **not** merged with MyHeritage.

MyHeritage has no access to your DNA or matches on FTDNA. This is entirely about where you can store and maintain your DNA tree for your FTDNA tests, all types: FamilyFinder, mtDNA, yDNA.



Irish Interest Group second meeting

The second meeting of the revived Irish Interest Group occurred at the APFHC at Paraparaumu Library on Tuesday 13th August.

There was an attendance of ten, with all eight members from the first meeting returning and two others. One of the new attendees was a non-member who came across one of our announcements and has now joined the branch.

The discussion of new finds included one who was shipwrecked off Liverpool while crossing from Ireland, discovered in a report in the National Archives of Ireland.

One member who was about to visit Ireland asked for advice on where to visit to advance his family history research, particularly at local level. Ireland Reaching Out https://irelandxo.com was mentioned, with one member finding it very useful and another not having much luck. Apparently, it depends where your interest lies in Ireland. Local libraries were also found to be a good source of local knowledge.

The discussion topic for the meeting was the 'townland', a uniquely Irish land division, with a summary leaflet distributed. It was the smallest administrative unit in Ireland and vital to finding where an Irish family came from. For rural areas, it was essentially a family's address. It occurs in valuation records, in census records, as the place of residence in Civil BMD records. It is often recorded in church BMDs and is usually given on gravestone inscriptions and in wills.

The second hour was used for individuals to advance their research, with the more experienced guiding

the newcomers to Irish family history. Graeme McVerry

Wanganui Evening Herald 8 Mar 1871

Irish emigrants in America have long been distinguished for the manner in which they save up and send money to their friends at home. Irish men and women in New Zealand, we learn from the *Freeman*, a new paper put out at Greymouth, are equally deserving of praise in this respect. During the year 1870, the large sum of £43,000 was remitted to various parts of Ireland by Irish colonists, the whole of such remittances being in small amounts. Three-fourths of the senders were women, and the money so sent was chiefly to assist and support aged parents, and to pay for passage money, in part or whole, to bring out brothers and sisters, and even more distant relations.


