Several evening meetings had the benefit of hearing her informative and amusing experiences while meeting distant relatives. She used the mapping facilities of 'The Genealogist', one of our sites at the APFHC, to show the movements of family members and how land ownership changed.

Updates: 1921 Census and The Genealogist

You now have the choice of where to look for your relatives in the **1921 Census** for England and Wales on our computers at the APFHC (our corner of the Paraparaumu Library).

Previously only available on FindMyPast, Ancestry now also includes these records, having added them on January 7th .

The Genealogist update

The Genealogist reports that they have added 39 directories spanning 1935-40. This site is on our computers at the APFHC and adds 6 million individuals and businesses to their resources. All from around the start of the Second World War.

Family Tree, 2025 - plus

For those that haven't yet learnt that you can read the latest issue of Family Tree on the "Libby" app. available with your library card, the January and February issues are now accessible.

The January Issue contains a good variety of articles; one about the Channel Islands FHS, with websites and contacts of interest. is followed by an article on tackling brick walls, based on place and time of the event to put the block into context.

Genealogist, Alison Spring, aka the Frugal Family Historian, gives an excellent run down on 'Free Family History Software.

In the February Issue, Dr. Sophie Kay writes the first of a two-part series on 'Finding your way with Historical maps.'

However, If you are Interested in **medical treatments** of the past? Cambridge University has digitized one of the largest surviving sets of medical records in history. It comes from the records of the astrologers Simon Forman and Richard Napier back in the decades around 1600. The Guild of One Name Studies (GOONS) adds: "It's a very name-rich database and searching names of interest shows a lot of useful if inconsistent genealogical information.

DNA News

I wonder what announcements the DNA companies will make at the upcoming RootsTech conference at the beginning of March?

I'm hoping for the beginning of the roll out of FamilyTreeDNA's new mitoTree and associated Discover tools, even though I don't expect it to provide great breakthroughs for me as yet. One day I'll find mtDNA candidates to check against our sides' representatives for assorted brickwalls.

Ancestry is Beta testing some changes to ThruLines where you can more quickly see whether or not any of your ThruLine HINTS might already be connected in your tree. So if you do try to connect matches into your tree, AND have a suitable subscription beyond the basic DNA: in Tree view, select the ancestor to see the "Add DNA matches descendant from x" link, which shows two options. Add to tree or Already in tree.

All hints need evaluating and checking. Not that any of us has time, or inclination, to add all our DNA matches to our trees online.



For those interested in how Ancestry determines what is, or is not likely to be, a DNA match they have published a new White Paper about how they determine your DNA matches and their matches, along with the likely relationships.

All welcome, whether new to Irish research or experienced.



The Townland Atlas of Ulster by Andrew Kane

This publication maps all 16,000 townlands in the 9 counties of Ulster and the administrative units of church and state into which they have been organised. In an attractive and easily understood layout, these units are shown in the context of land ownership in the 17th century, a pattern clearly recognisable until a century ago when the Land Purchase Acts broke up the estates and facilitated tenant farmers buying their own land. By using the maps and index, family and local historians can easily grasp the essentials of our ancestors' lives – where they worked, paid their rent, went to church and market, etc.

The APFHC is located at Paraparaumu Library. Turn right inside the library entrance to the area containing six computers, microfiche and library. The cupboard on the right hand side of the area contains the red folders mentioned below.

Members need to get the cupboard key from the library Issuing Desk, when you will be asked to sign for the key and show your membership card for the current year.

Computer Password at the APFHC

The APFHC computer password changes regularly: check the red Computer Help folder in the top drawer.

Please sign the red signing-in book found in the top drawer.

Keyboards are in the lowest drawer. Replace the cover on the computer when you leave and lock the keyboard in the cupboard.

All six computers have subscriptions to Ancestry, FindMyPast and access to The Genealogist and Roots Ireland as well as free sites like FamilySearch. (Use your own log-in to FamilySearch).

NB. Please do **NOT** sign out of Rootslreland, FindMyPast or TheGenealogist. Please **do not switch off** the printer.

A microfiche reader is available and there are books on a variety of topics that can be borrowed. Boxes of copies of 'Who do you think you are' and 'Family Tree' are on the shelf.

You are encouraged to save the results of your searches on a USB memory stick or send them to your own email address.

We have a printer if you wish to print a hard copy. Please put 10c per copy in the honesty box on the cupboard door.
